Enhancing education on climate change in your classroom

Yukon University now has an Outreach Climatologist to support Yukon educators in facilitating a clear understanding of the central issues surrounding climate change (mechanism, impacts, and responses) in their classrooms. The Outreach Climatologist works with educators to identify specific needs and capacity, then develops and delivers an action plan, which may include:

- One-time or recurring classroom visit(s) from the Outreach Climatologist to deliver or support guest lectures, workshops, or activities.
- Providing educators with age- and curriculum-appropriate climate change resources they can use in their classrooms (e.g. readings, audiovisual material, lesson plans).
- Professional development for educators (e.g. climate change science basics, tips for teaching climate change, resources for supporting students with eco anxiety/grief).

Content for any of the above may include climate change science and knowledge, impacts, responses, communication, health, and resilience, with an emphasis on local context, reconciliation, and different worldviews.

Agriculture in the Classroom

<u>Agriculture in the Classroom</u> is excited to invite Yukon schools to participate in a national competition. The four-week program, **Mission Explorium**, starts on February 19, with registration open until January 31. This engaging cross-curricular program requires students to dedicate 1-2 hours weekly to complete various activities, including videos, quizzes, and individual workbooks.

Designed for **Grades 6-8**, Mission Explorium aligns with curricula across Canada, challenging classes to navigate four quests on a deserted island, focusing on Ecosystems, Agriculture, Food, and Culture. This free resource groups classes into regions, culminating in a competition where the top class from each region showcases their projects, competing for the national champion title. Teachers need only a computer to access the resources and a class eager to showcase their creativity and understanding of sustainability.
