Educator Update this week

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New First Nation School Board

Last week marked a historic moment in the Yukon, as we received the <u>results the First Nation School Board</u> <u>referendum</u>. Seven school communities voted in favour of being operated under the new Yukon First Nation School Board, and are on track to transfer for the 2022-23 school year:

- Chief Zzeh Gittlitt School in Old Crow,
- Ross River School in Ross River.
- St. Elias Community School in Haines Junction,
- Johnson Elementary School and Watson Lake Secondary School in Watson Lake,
- Nelnah Bessie John School in Beaver Creek,
- Takhini Elementary School in Whitehorse, and
- Grey Mountain Primary School in Whitehorse.

Establishing the Yukon First Nation School Board is a major step in advancing reconciliation – a path that started 49 years ago with the historic document, championed by Yukon First Nations Chiefs: <u>Together Today for our Children Tomorrow</u>. The new school board is also an example of effective collaboration among Yukon First Nations and the Government of Yukon in supporting First Nations students, and in ensuring all Yukon students benefit from learning about Yukon First Nations ways of knowing, doing and being.

Staff at the schools listed above remain employees of the Government of Yukon, as outlined in legislation and bound by applicable collective agreements. Principals of these schools will report to the board's executive director rather than a superintendent within the Schools and Student Services Branch. The schools will continue to deliver the British Columbia curriculum and be subject to the Yukon's Education Act.

There is a lot of work and planning in the days and months ahead to make the transition, and many of you will have questions about what this means for those schools. All impacted staff are invited to a Q&A session to

Professional learning opportunities

Carol Ann Tomlinson: workshop on what it means to "teach up"

LSF climate change education survey

<u>Yukon's Youth Panel on Climate Change</u> has called us to action! Answer the call to all educators, parents, students and members of the general public: <u>Learning for a Sustainable Future</u> (LSF) needs to hear your voice on the importance of climate change education in Canada!

This survey is an opportunity to provide Yukon's voice in the national movement for positive climate action through education. It also provides a good understanding of where you sit in your knowledge, values and efforts towards this all-encompassing issue. The survey takes 15 to 20 minutes to complete and answers will remain confidential and anonymous.

The results will be used to develop recommendations to governments, school districts and educators to help Canadian youth address climate change. The 2021-2022 survey is being conducted with support from Environment and Climate Change Canada and the <u>Canadian Teachers' Federation</u>. <u>Leger</u>, the largest Canadian owned market research company, is providing data collection and analysis. **Deadline: February 11, 2022.**
